James H. Dillon, 73, Dies; Was Recreation Director

James Harold Dillon of 32 Kenwood Circle, Bloomfield, recreation director of Hartford for nearly 40 years before his retirement three years ago, died suddenly Saturday at his home. He was 73.

During his years at the helm of the city's recreation program, he earned national recognition for himself and for Hartford for his efforts in building and expanding the program. In 1956, the city placed his name on what used to be the Municipal Stadium in Colt's Park in recognition of his service

Born in Hartford, Feb. 2, 1890, a son of the late James D. and Nellie M. Hayes Dillon, he lived in and around the city all his life.

Mr. Dillon was appointed supervisor of recreation in 1921 to assist in the planning and development of Hartford's recreation program.

During the years that followed. he compiled a never-ending list of recreation accomplishments.

He helped organize and direct the after-school recreation programs in schools, housing projects and private properties, providing a year-round leisure time porgram for all ages.

The same program was expanded into the city's park properties.
